The world is hungering for people of integrity. While the world says it wants people of integrity, scandals continue to abound. It seems like what the world hungers for and what the world will settle for are totally different.

Therefore, is it possible to be a person of integrity in the fast and loose world we live in today? What will it take for a man or woman to live a holy life in an unholy world? What are the costs? What are the rewards?

What is integrity? The dictionary defines it as 'The quality of being honest and having strong moral principles'. References that offer synonyms for integrity list such words as honesty, incorruptness, purity, honour, righteousness, faithfulness and trustworthiness. It is clear that integrity is a character virtue that involves being honest, upright, and incorruptible. We look for and hope for this quality in the people we deal with on every level of life.

Students of this life say it is "impossible and impractical to live this way". We are told to get our "heads out of the sky and feet on the ground". They quickly warn us that, "such people will not get far in this world". But God does not hold in high regard the way in which the world expects a person to live. We are instructed in Col. 1:10, "... walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, to please Him in all respects".

Has anyone ever lived a successful life of integrity? Yes, and his name is Daniel.

Because of his formidable talents and gifts, he was taken captive and trained to serve the kings of conquering empires, Dan. 1:4, 17, and 19.

Daniel was clearly a person of integrity. Daniel was true to God. Very early in his life he determined not even to violate God's food and drink commandments, Dan. 1:8. Later in his life he continued to pray to God even though the King signed a law prohibiting it, Dan. 6:7. Daniel was blameless & incorruptible. He was neither negligent in his work nor corrupt in his dealings, Dan. 6:4. Daniel was victorious over his enemies. Read about his lion's den experience in Dan. 6:23-28. Daniel stood his ground, thereby honouring God and was promoted, Dan. 2:46-48; 6:25-28.

A believer can live a life of integrity. Dare to be a Daniel in a slippery slope world. All you can manage is the quality of your character, let God manage your success.

The legendary college basketball coach John Wooden taught his players, "Be more concerned with your character than your reputation, because your character is what you really are, while your reputation is merely what others think you are."

May we live as the writer of Psalm 15:1-2 discovered, "O Lord, who may abide in Your tent? Who may dwell on Your holy hill? He who walks with integrity and works righteousness, and speaks truth in his heart."  $\pmb{\Omega}$

# Learn & Live: Adult Bible Class

It took a group of members led by Pastor Arnold to brainstorm and come up with the goal and purpose of the Adult Bible Class, which is: Challenging people to change their world by living Biblical truths daily.

Adult Bible Class is an updated and expanded version of the Grace Bible Fellowship which has had many successful runs in the past years. The new Bible classes are designed to provide choices so that more people – the young and not so young adults – are encouraged to attend Sunday classes.

The curriculum is structured to cover five main components. These are: Fundamentals of the Gospel, Books of the Bible, Christian Doctrines, Christian Living and Engaging the World. Our three pastors Bobby, Eugene and Oliver, and their respective teams, are leading the three classes on three different tracks covering Christian Living, Two Ways To Live and God's Story. Participants can choose to attend any of these tracks based on their spiritual needs.

Since classes started in February, they have been well attended. The classes provide a conducive environment for teaching, interactive learning, intergenerational discussion, and Q&A sessions on issues that confront our faith and our walk in the Lord. Pastor Eugene Low uses the analogy of a tree. Before we can live Biblically, our minds must be nourished with God's Word, then we will be able to grow to produce good fruit.

We are called to "live a life worthy of the Lord and please Him in every way, bearing fruit in every good work and



growing in the knowledge of God" Colossians 1:10. To achieve it, Pastor Oliver so succinctly summarises: Head, Heart, Hands. If you are not sure what that means, attend the Bible classes. You will learn, you will be challenged, you will change, and you will live. Glory be to God.  $\Omega$ 

# Integrity for Students

Why is integrity one of the core values emphasised in many schools today? With pop culture permeating the minds of the younger generation at an exponential rate, there is an urgent need to intervene.

Integrity is adherence to moral principles or honesty. However, students today might not even have strong foundational values and beliefs to adhere to; or they may simply be unaware of the consequences of their actions and thus have an 'I can get away with it' mentality.

In school, there are various areas in which students need to be taught the importance of integrity. Suitable role models can also help to provide a positive example of how to practise integrity. One of these areas is certainly academics. As the pressure to attain excellence increases, coupled with the diminishing sense of integrity, students are inclined to commit acts of academic dishonesty. This occurs not only in tests and exams, but also in the form of plagiarism in papers or projects. Computers and the Internet have made it easy for students to do so. Educating

them in this area is thus crucial. When approached, many students say that their need to attain good grades is not just due to competition, but also to gain approval from parents (even teachers). This hints at a deeper underlying problem of low self-esteem that needs to be addressed.

Another area would be in the sporting arena. Many students are blinded by the need to win. Again, the motivation is not merely for the glory of winning, but also because through winning, students wish to garner approval of their coaches and parents.

Compromising of integrity can also be seen in their speech, which is evident in online platforms like Facebook or blogs. Students' comments on controversial issues or even their reflections indicate the erosion of moral principles.

Schools can only do so much to instill integrity in the young, and educate them in the various areas. It is still the responsibility of parents to ensure that their child is morally upright – grounded on God's Word and ways.  $\Omega$

There are rules, codes of ethics and by-laws that corporations and societies have imposed for us to follow. Even if it is burdensome

and onerous at times, these rules are installed for good reasons, one of which is to help us maintain our integrity in business dealings. We are also reminded to submit to governance and authorities as prescribed in Scripture (Romans 13:1).

As Christians, our own integrity should be motivated by a desire to live as God prescribes, and this standard is above those established at the workplace and in society. We are to apply God's wisdom and discernment, especially in the grey areas. Only then will our integrity be upheld. Trust from our bosses, co-workers, clients and business associates can be built up only if there is integrity.

We are always tempted to make more with less, and although nobody may be looking when we compromise our integrity, the truth will always come into light. We have seen countless notable cases such as Nick Leeson (Barings), Jeffrey Skilling (Enron) and recently Bernard Madoff (Ponzi scheme).

On the practical side of things, one helpful principle is that 'we must say what we mean, and do what we say'. We are called to be salt and light of this world, and being consistent in our speech and manner is one way to prove that we are people of our word.

Our integrity stems primarily from our value system. A large part of it is imparted during our childhoodyears and in school. More importantly, the knowledge and true understanding of God's precepts should be the absolute standard of ethics on which our integrity should be built.

We have to walk straight in a crooked world with the wisdom from Proverbs 3:5-6.  $\Omega$

Relationships are the key to life. Life without meaningful relationships can be likened to a day without sunshine. But meaningful relationships have to be built on timeless virtues like integrity. How does all this show up in other relationships? When daughters asked our advice about choosing a mate, we shared with them this principle: character over chemistry. We hoped they would seek out a person with Godly character. Chemistry is important, but character is more important. In the Book of Ruth, this principle is displayed in the lives of Ruth and Boaz. Both reflected Godly character in their conduct. Godly character will serve as a strong foundation on which to build a strong marriage.

Integrity plays an important role in marriage. In Eph. 4:15, believers should be known for "...speaking the truth in love". Speaking the truth can be hard at times, but nevertheless we are exhorted to do so. But, notice that the verse also says, "...in love". This means being humble, gentle, and patient, Eph. 4:2-3, and being wise in our choice of words, Eph. 4:29. Always seek to help, rather than to hurt another person.

Husbands and wives should be able to trust what one another says and why they said it. When there is trust between spouses, husband and wife

are able to grow and flourish instead of wilt and die. Love grows best in a soil that is fortified by honesty and love. Spouses will tend to share, listen, care, and pray together in a healthy environment like this. It will afford us the opportunity to experience what is described in Proverbs 27:15, "Iron sharpens iron. So one man sharpens another."

Be all that God wants you to be – be a person of integrity. Seek people of integrity and Godly character to be your closest confidants.

So, whether it is in our relationships with one another or in regards to relationships with spouses, or God, integrity plays a major role.  $\Omega$





But my search for role models came to an end when I stumbled on the book, A Life of Integrity, given to me a long time ago. Alas, I tucked it away in



scripture, imbibing him with a sense of relief knowing that there are Godly people to show us the way. This book is the kind


> of book I would buy to give those around me, knowing we all need positive influence and proof that we can be in this world, but not of it.

Elmbrook's TV and radio ministries—Telling the Truth—featuring Stuart and Jill are broadcast widely while his extensive video and audio tapes and more then 40 books extend his ministry. After 30 years as senior pastor at Elmbrook Church, Stuart has stepped down and he and Jill have assumed the roles of Ministers-at-Large on Elmbrook's church staff.



Dr Tan Lai Yong graduated from National University of Singapore in 1985. In 1996, together with his wife and 1-year old daughter, he moved to Yunnan in SW China, where he ran a village doctors training program. Later, his family of 4 moved to Kunming, where he taught in the Kunming Medical University and also led the medical work in Bless China International (a Yunnan based NGO). He has also published a few books, such as Biting The Bamboo and Two Ears But Only One Mouth.
