DECONSTRUCTING ... PERANAKAN BELT BUCKLES

These stunning 22 carat gold Peranakan belt buckles were made in Singapore between the 1930s and the 1950s. Worn by Peranakan women with a gold or silver belt, they were used to hold up their sarong which was traditionally worn with a kebaya.



Typical of the time, one of the buckles features an intricately carved dragon and phoenix, motifs in Chinese mythology for marital harmony. They represent the yin (dragon) and yang (phoenix) balance essential for married life and were often commissioned as wedding gifts by wealthier Peranakan families.

These days, belt buckles are heirlooms, passed down from grandmothers with the promise they will never be removed from the family. However, if these were to come to market, we would estimate the smaller version could achieve \$8,000 - \$10,000 and the larger \$15,000 - \$18,000.
